Once back in Kawakawa, we continued our bus journey to Paihia for lunch. On our arrival we discovered Paihia was celebrating its 200



photos. The only rain we got that day, unfortunately for us, was while we were on the trikes. However, our driver stopped to give








Pukekohe

Long-time member of Silverstream 60s Up, Ruth Barnard was recently awarded Branch Life Membership in recognition of valuable contributions to the 60s Up Movement of New Zealand. A committee member for many years and our regular delegate to a number of National Conferences, Ruth also very much enjoyed eight 60s Up trips around New Zealand, organised by Coral Atkins and Molly Ballantyne of the Hastings Branch. Well done, Ruth!

During the winter, club members were treated to a talk by two super-keen librarians, Danny and Rhea, about the facilities offered at the Upper Hutt Library. Upper Hutt has two library branches, two mobile library services, Pūrehurehu Mobile Library Service which visits schools, kindergartens and community events, and Mangaroa Mobile Library Service used for special deliveries, such as to the elderly. If you are not sure of which books you would like to borrow, just ask a librarian for a recommendation. Upper Hutt library is part of the New Zealand inter-library loan service and can order a title for you for \$12, which covers the courier costs both ways. The library has many talking books available for using on your CD player, with a limit of 100 talking books at a time! Library staff watch their collection very closely and are always buying new releases and following up on New Zealand Book Awards, Radio New Zealand reviews and suggestions from the public. Non-fiction books can get out of date, especially if they are health-related, and are generally more expensive. Books that are withdrawn from the collection are available from a trolley for just 50c or \$1.

There is also a Book Group and a Poetry Discussion Group on classic and modern poetry and an annual poetry writing competition, a genre you might either love or hate! 'We have fantastic poets right here in Upper Hutt!'

There's also Paper Craft Creations, an art and craft and card making group, – better than a bought card or an email on those special occasions. Scrapbooking and colouring in enthusiasts are also welcome. There are more than 40 board games in the board games collection and 220 jigsaw puzzles for borrowing! There is a 500 Card Club for beginners and advanced players. You can hire a ukulele and join beginners and experienced players in the ukulele orchestra group at the library. A Family History Group where beginners and advanced researchers can share research successes, challenges, tips and advice. The Upper Hutt Local History Group members share and enjoy memories of Upper Hutt through the decades.

Computers are available for your use and Senior Net will assist you to set up your smart phone, laptop, ipad or tablet or other tech devices. Or you might need help to apply for a passport, set up an email account or use an on-line service. You can also borrow a Healthy Homes kit, an enterprise in conjunction with the City Council. It measures the humidity in your home and where the heat is escaping from. A specialist can also visit your home with ideas that will help your heating budget.

Other services include a visiting JP, and the free Community Law professionals. You don't have to be a ratepayer to join the library – anyone can join, free of charge. Why not pay a visit to your own local library some time soon? You might be surprised by what they have to offer. The speakers enjoyed visiting our club, saying we took an interest, more than usual, and asked good questions. Later in the winter, 35 members of Silverstream 60s Up made good use of the Lottery grant and travelled by bus along the recently opened Transmission Gully Road to Otaki where they enjoyed visiting a number of outlet shops, then lunched at Paekakariki's Fisherman's Table.
